





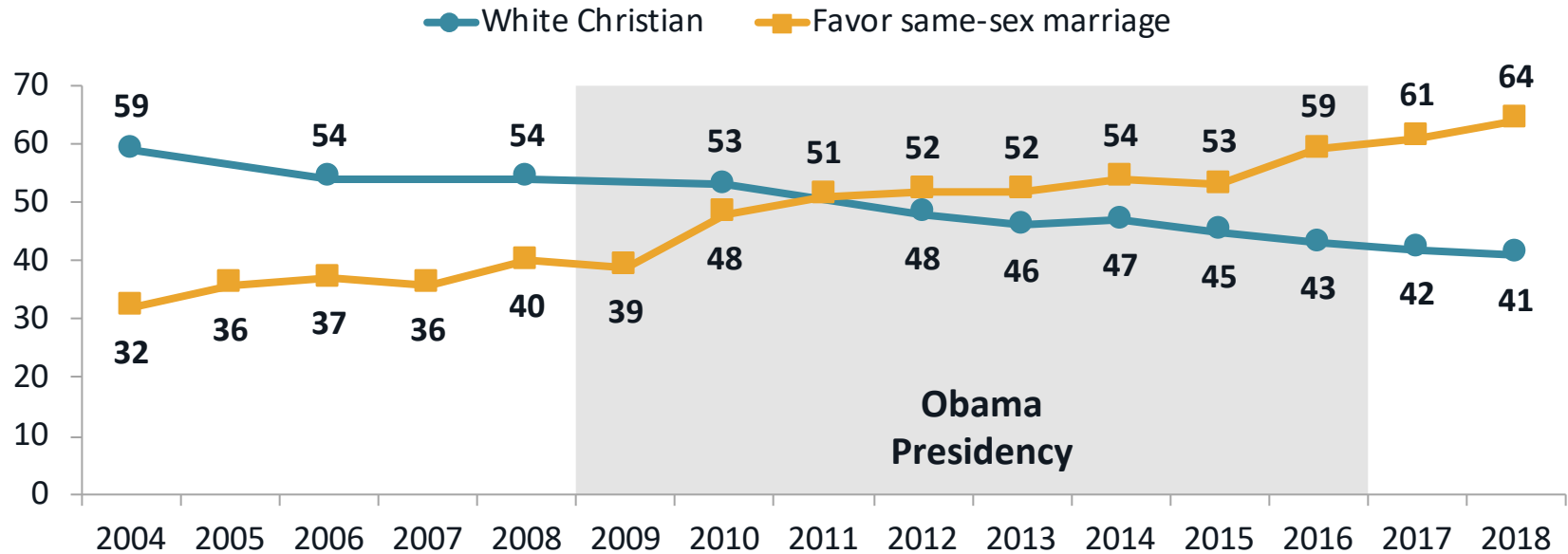

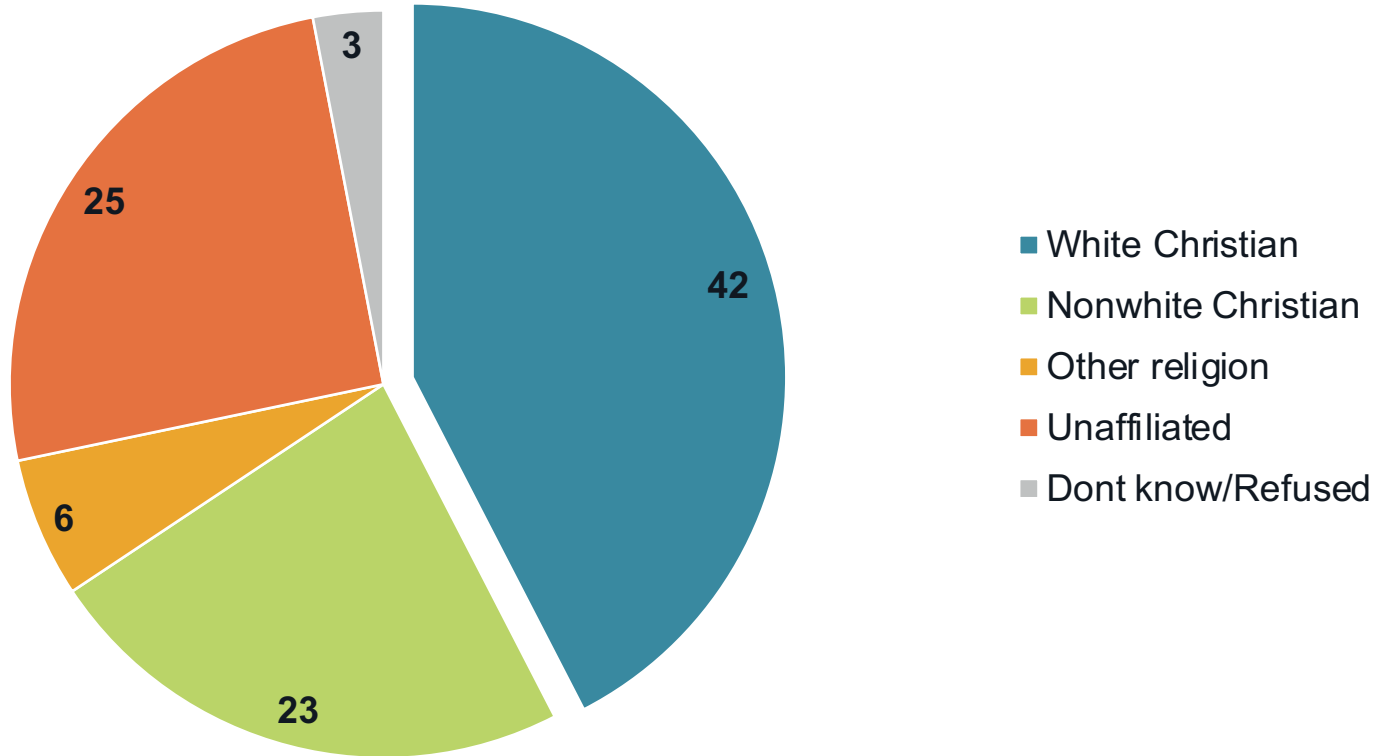
White Christian Minority, Same-sex Marriage Majority

Percent of Americans who are white Christian vs. percent who favor same-sex marriage, 2004-2018

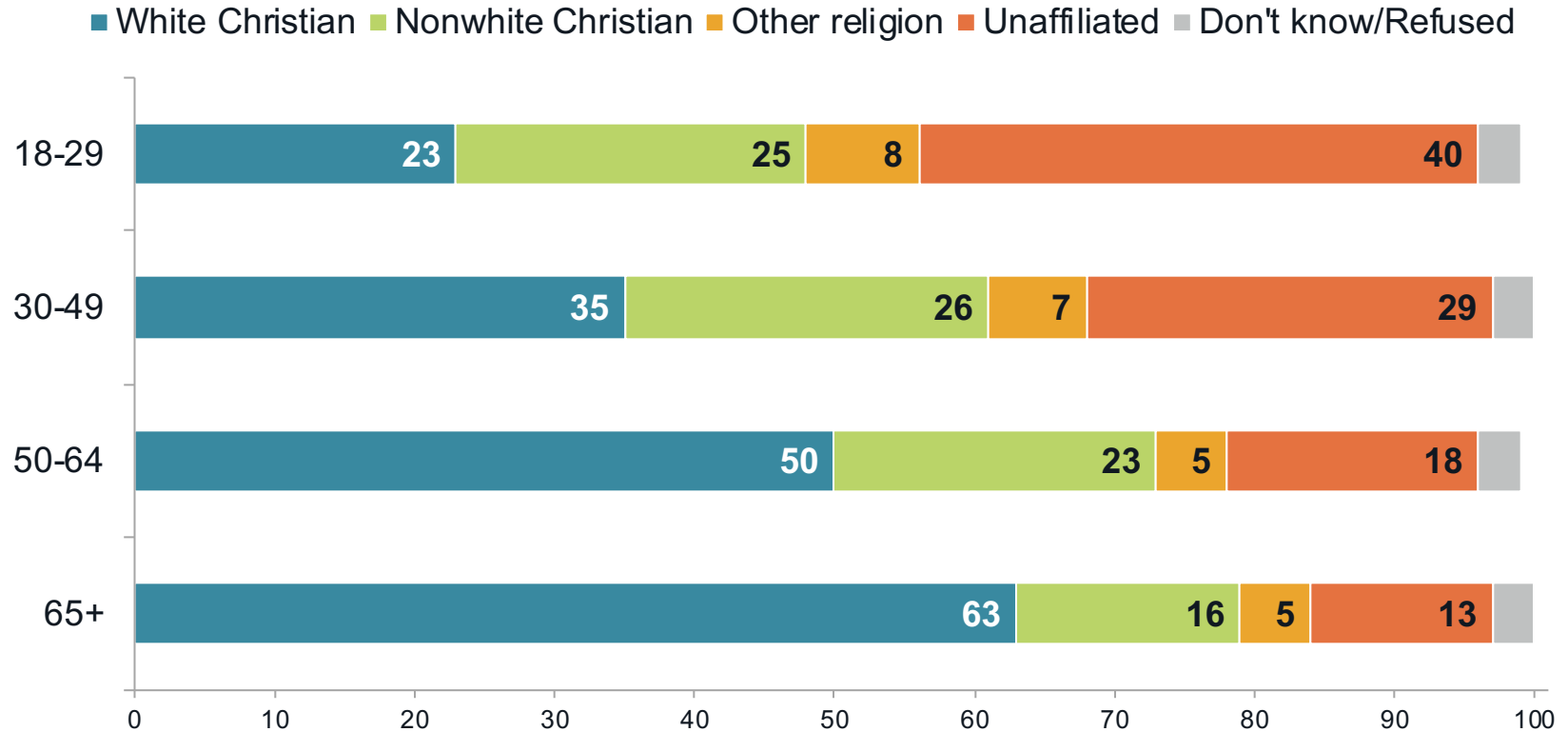

The Decline of White Christians by Age

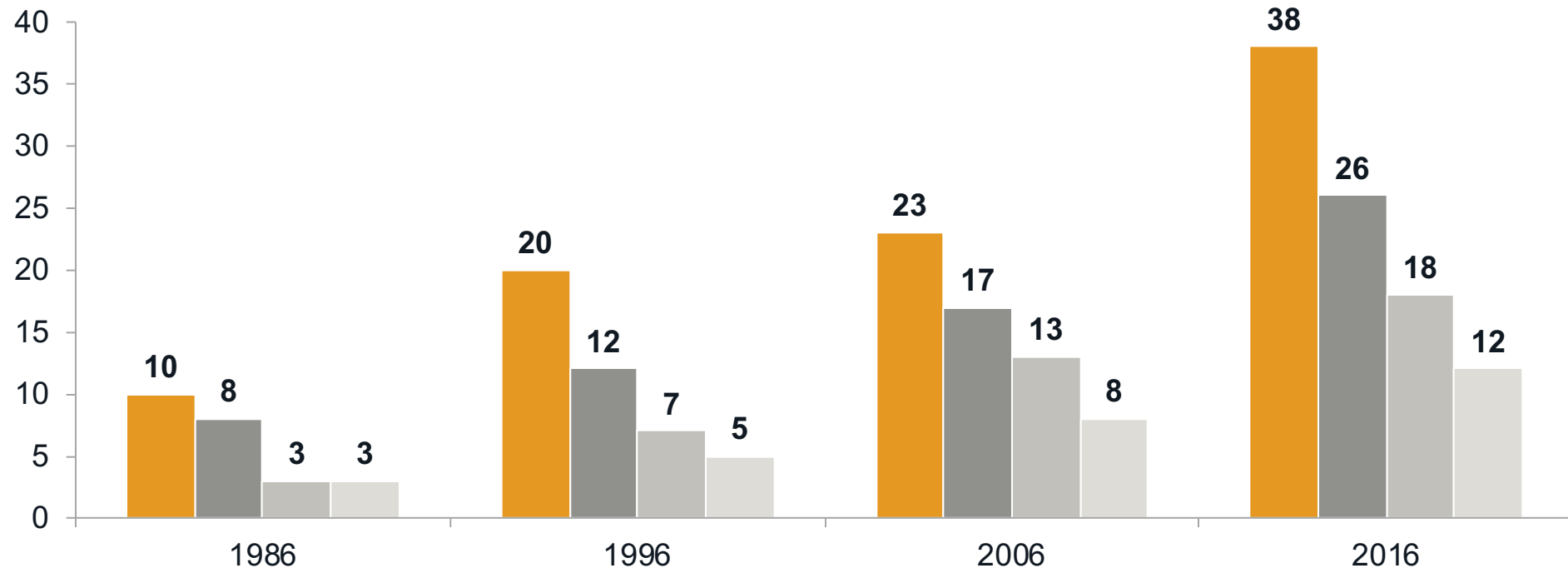

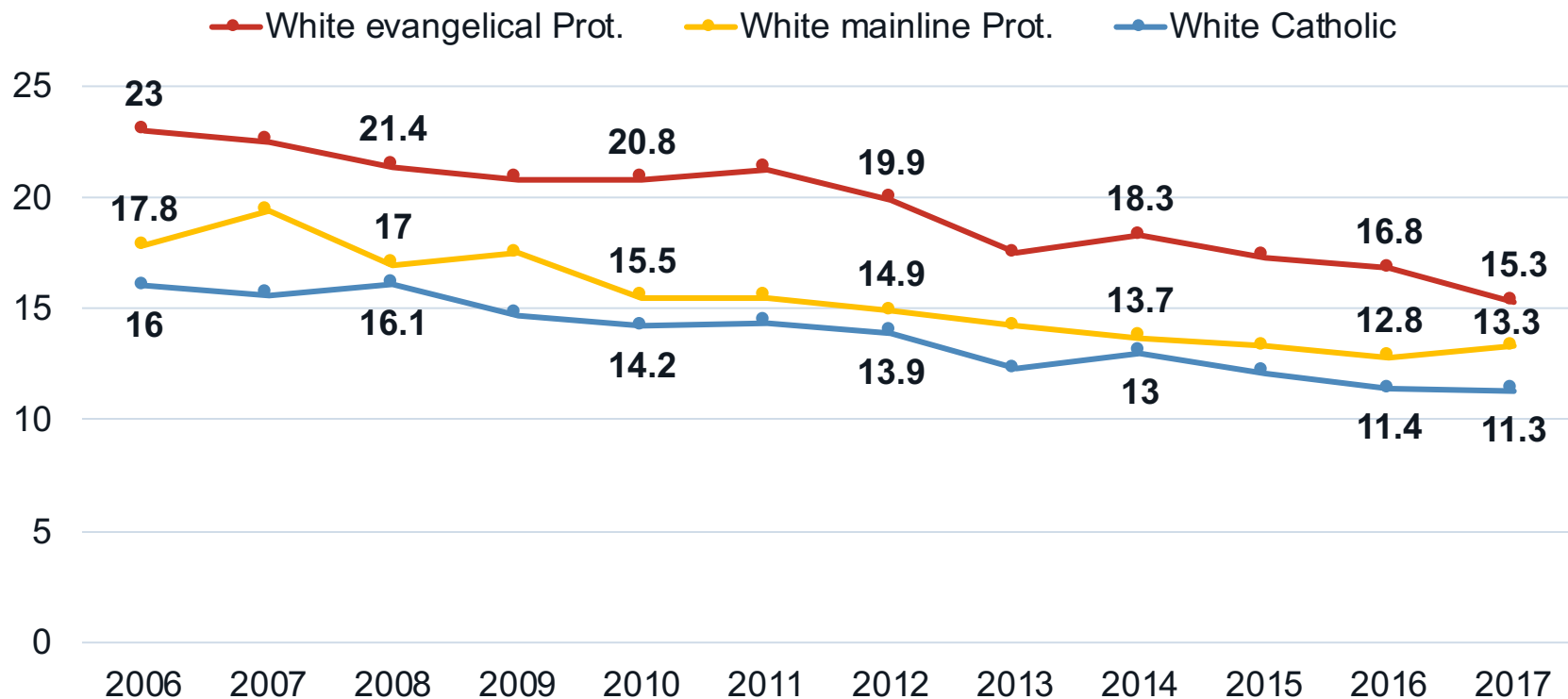
More Young Adults are Unaffiliated Today than in the Past

■ 18-29 ■ 30-49 ■ 50-64 ■ 65+



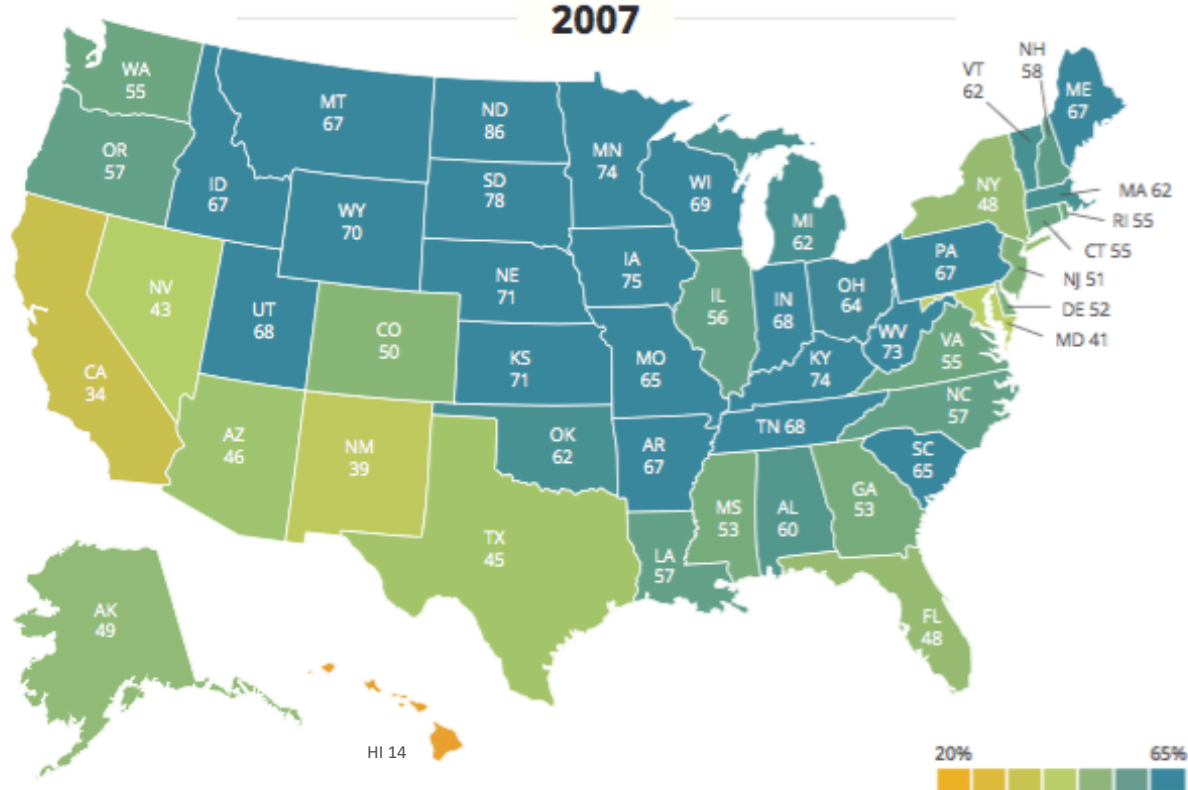
The Decline of White Christian Subgroups, 2006-2017

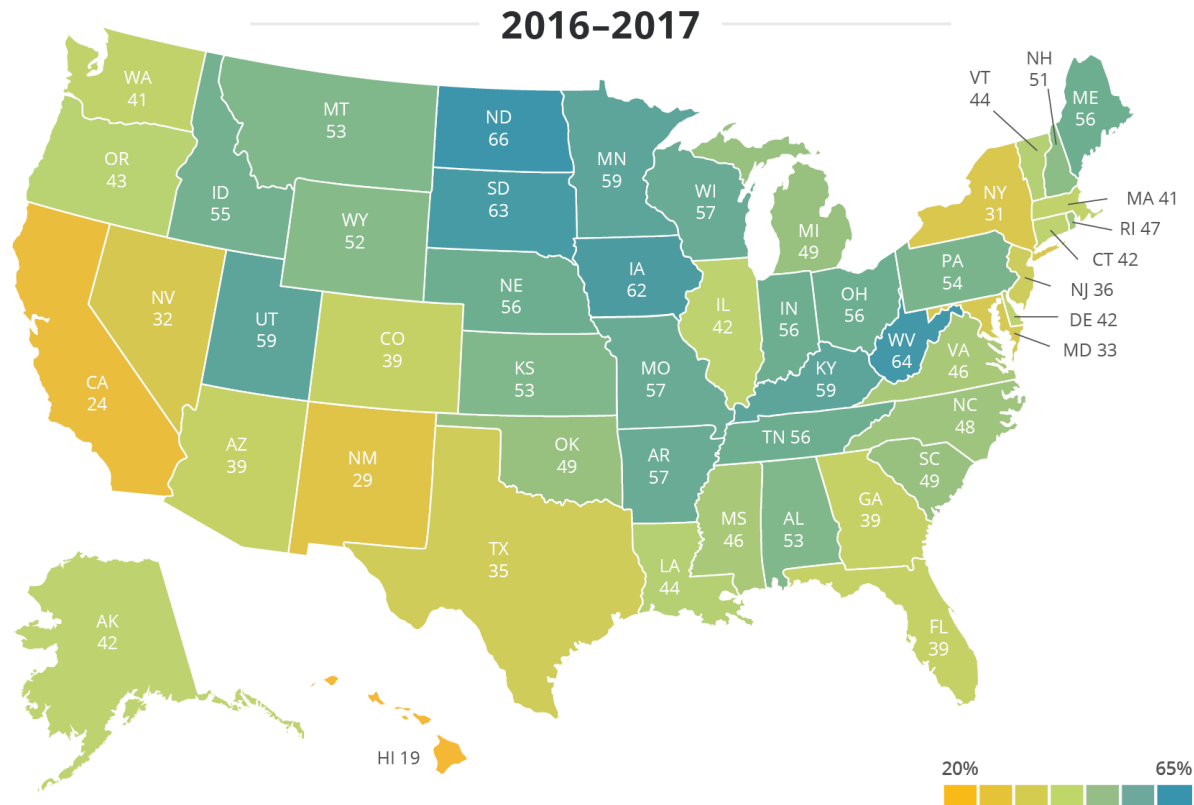
Decreasing Proportions of White Christians by State

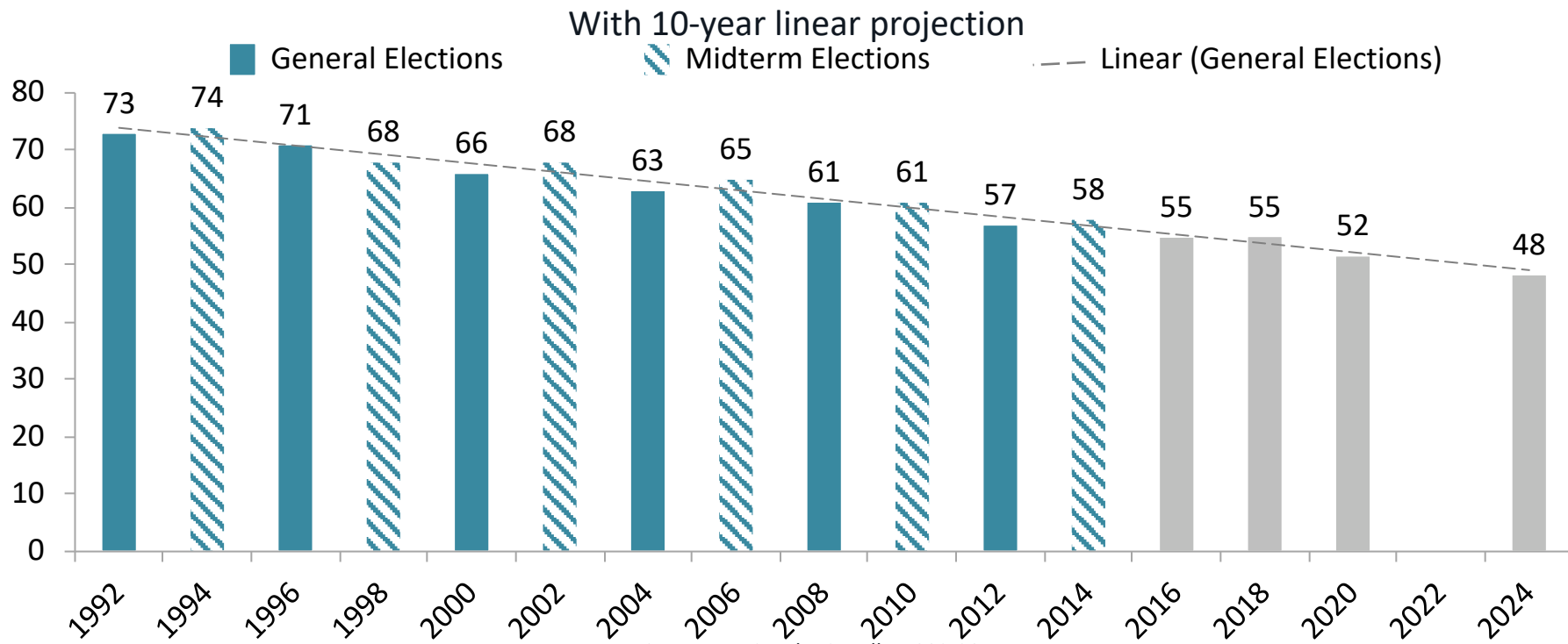
Percentage of White Christians by State, 2016-2017

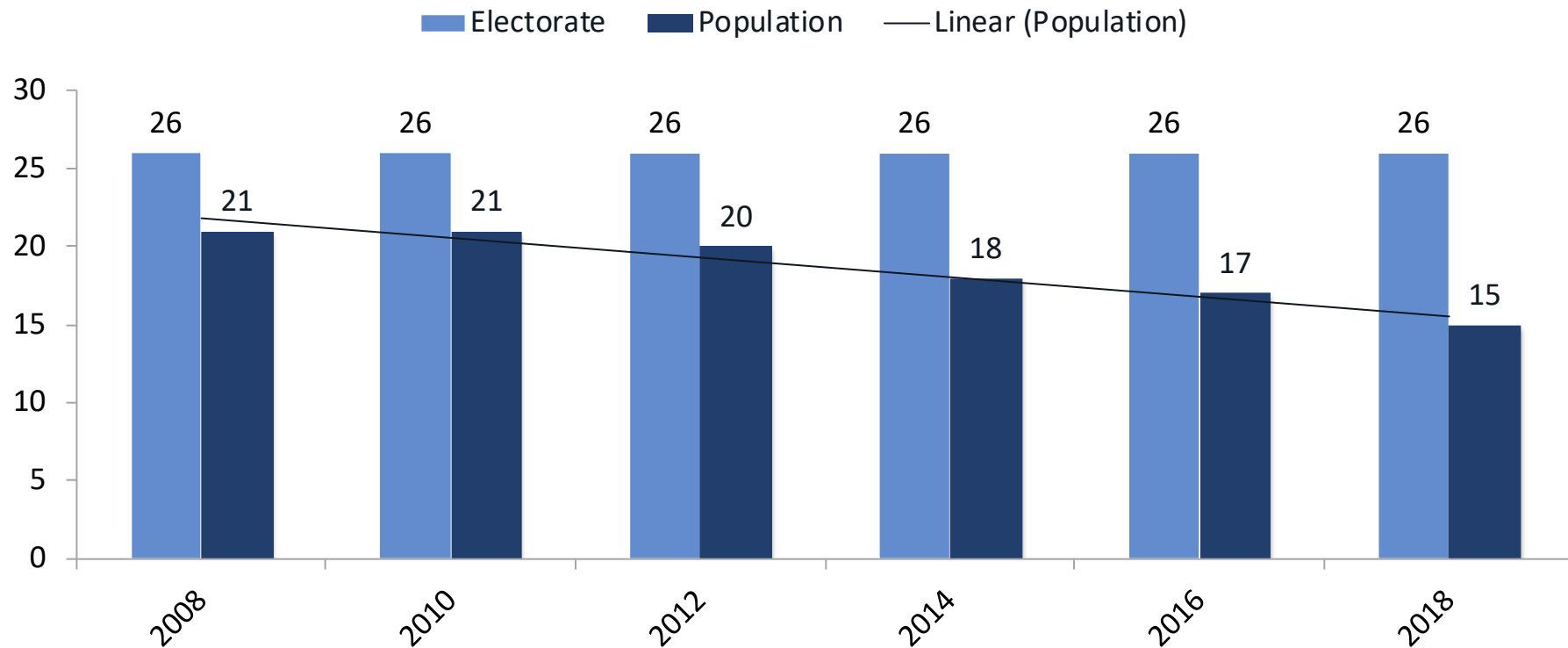
White Christians as a Proportion of the Electorate (1992-2014)

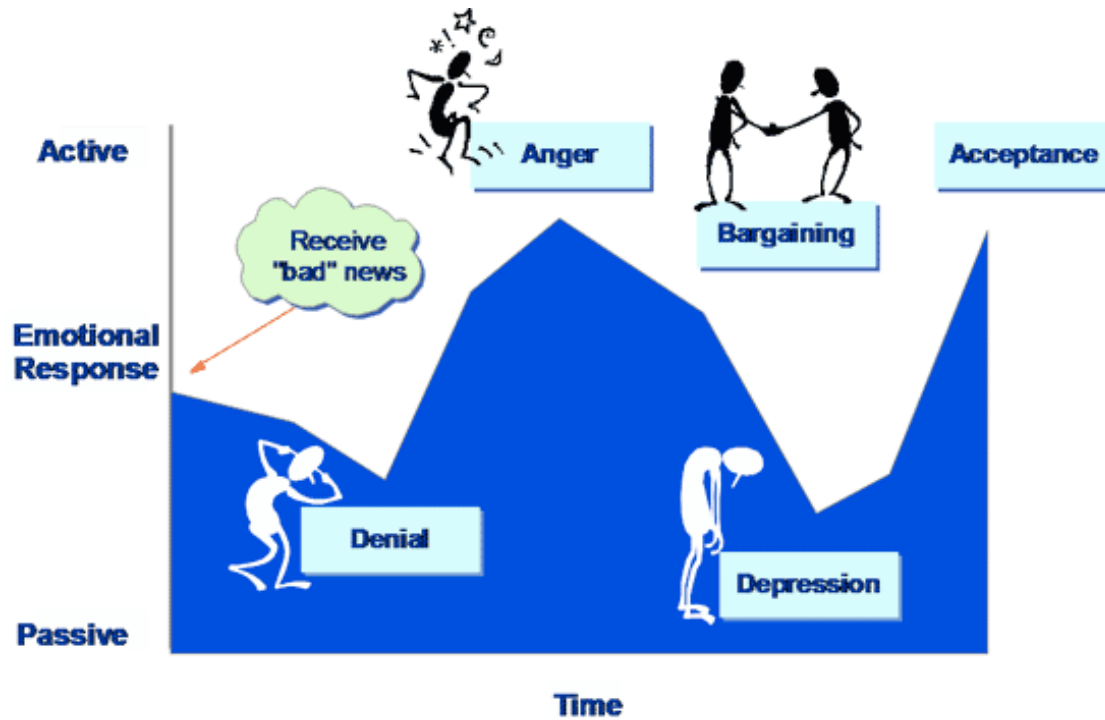
White Evangelicals, Proportion of Electorate vs. Population (2008-2018)

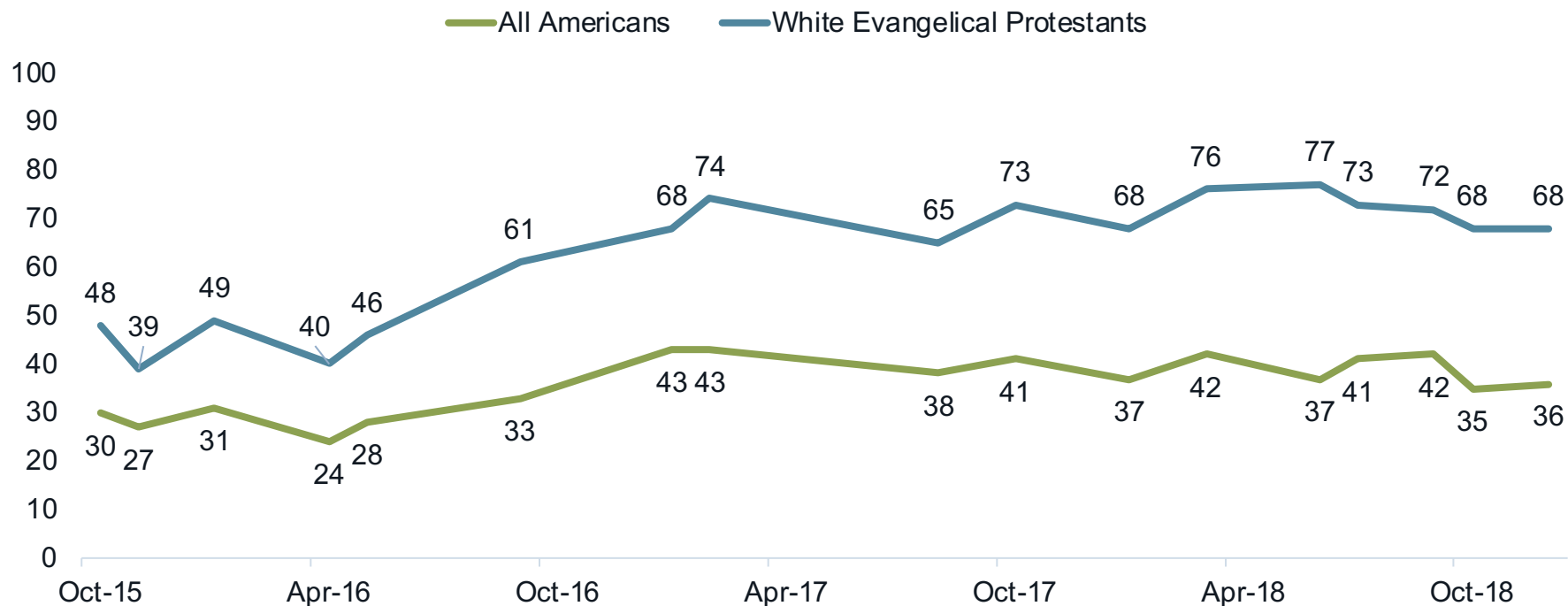

Favorability of Donald Trump Among White Evangelical Protestants, 2015-2018

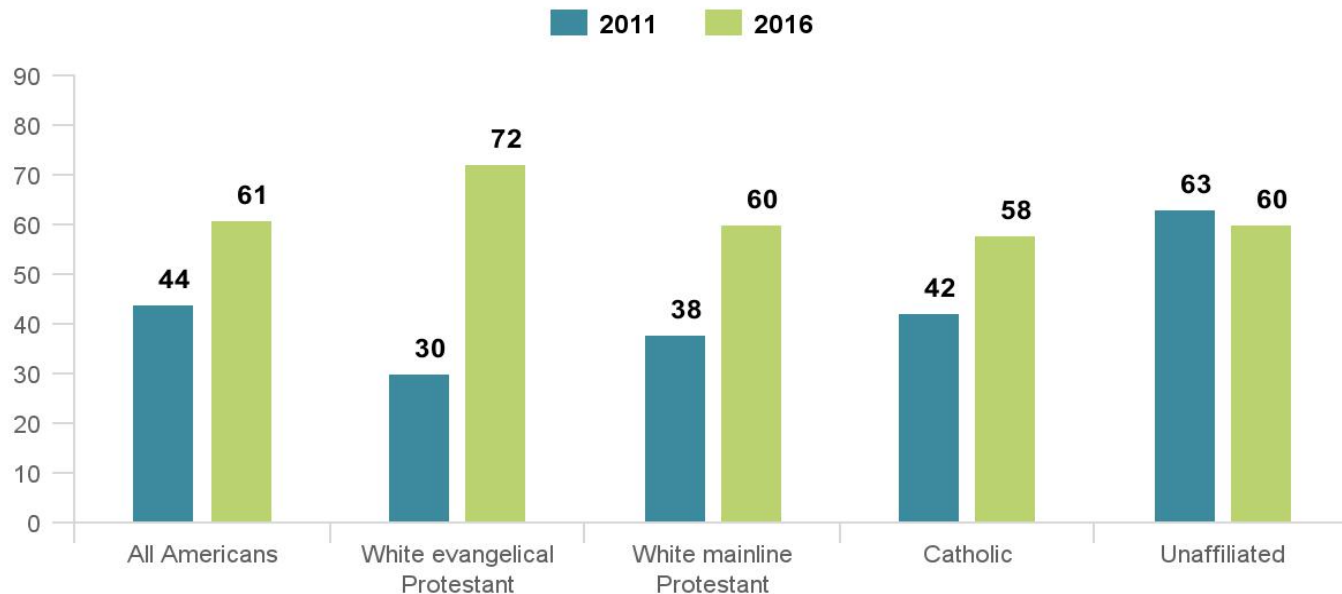

White Evangelicals Grow More Accepting of Politicians' Personal Indiscretions

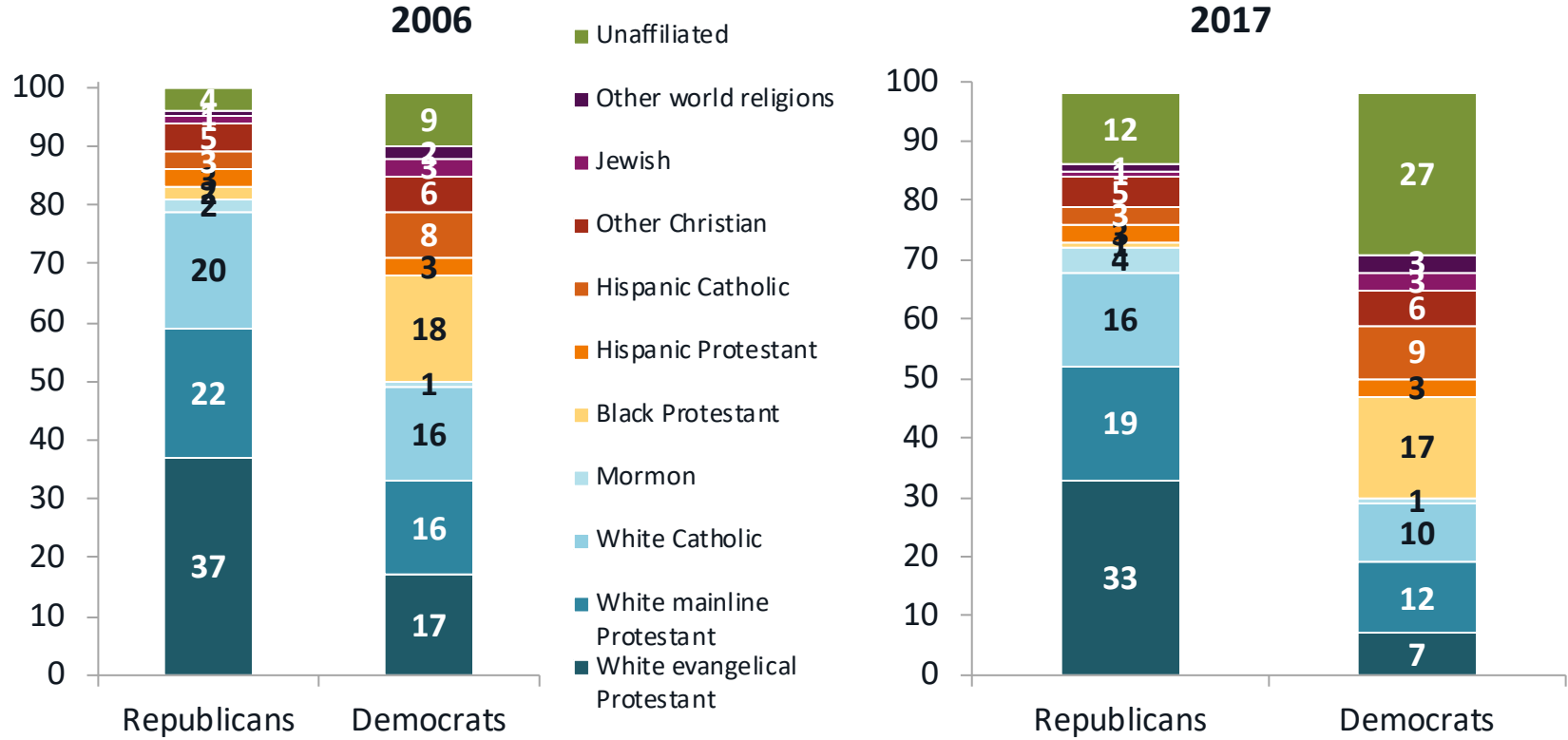
Percent who say an elected official who commits an immoral act in their personal life can still behave ethically and fulfill their duties in their public and professional life

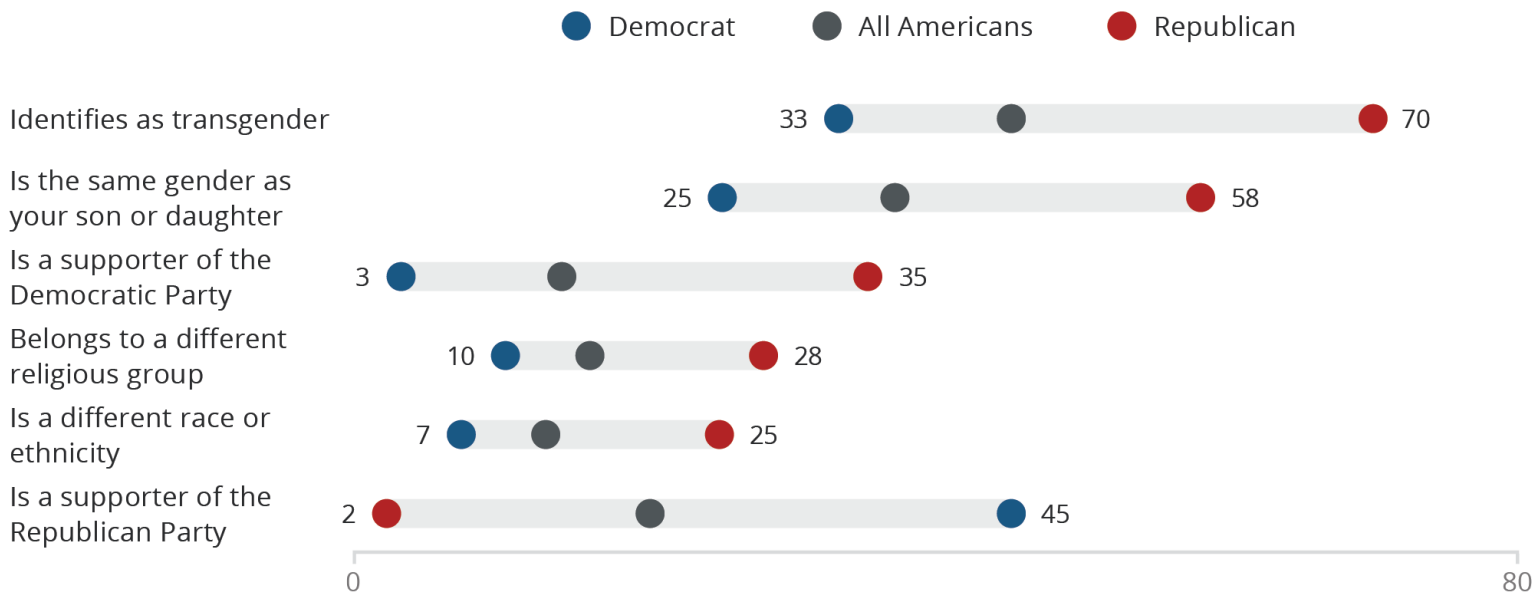

FIGURE 6. Sharp Partisan Divides Over Child Marriage Partner Choices

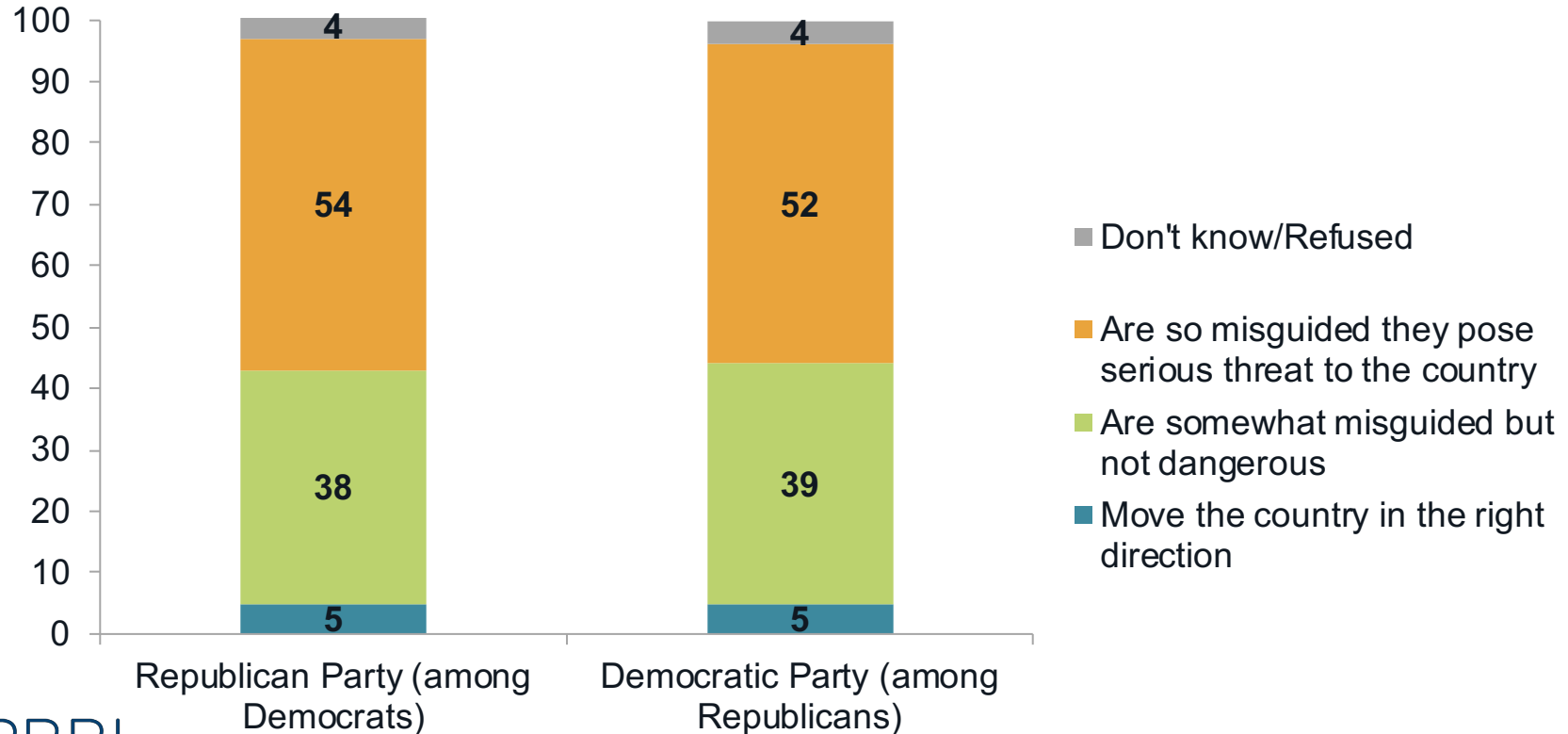
Percent who would be somewhat or very *unhappy* if their son or daughter married someone who...

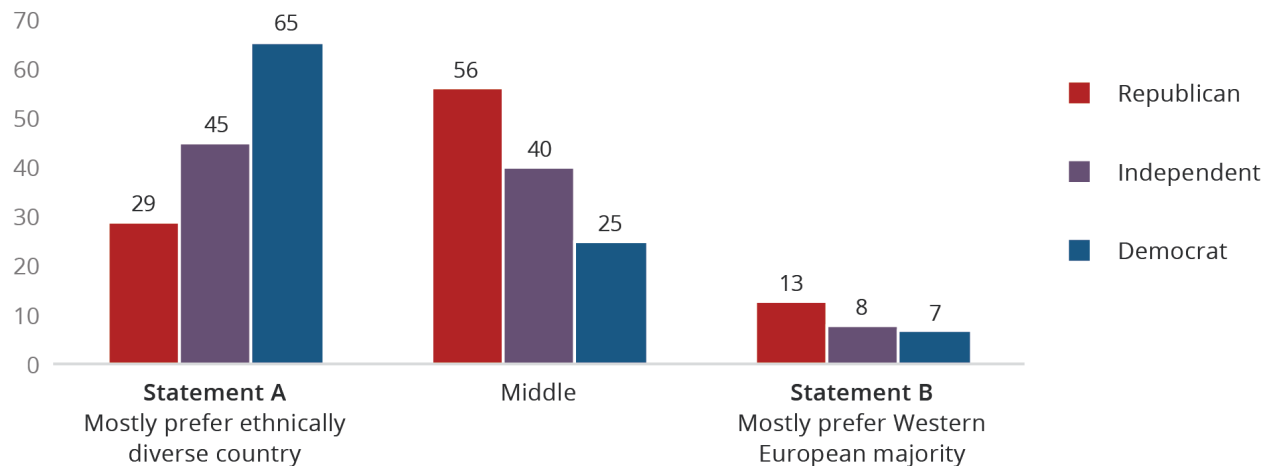


Stark Partisan Divides on the Ideal of Racial Diversity

Statement B: I would prefer the U.S. to be a nation primarily made up of people from Western European heritage.



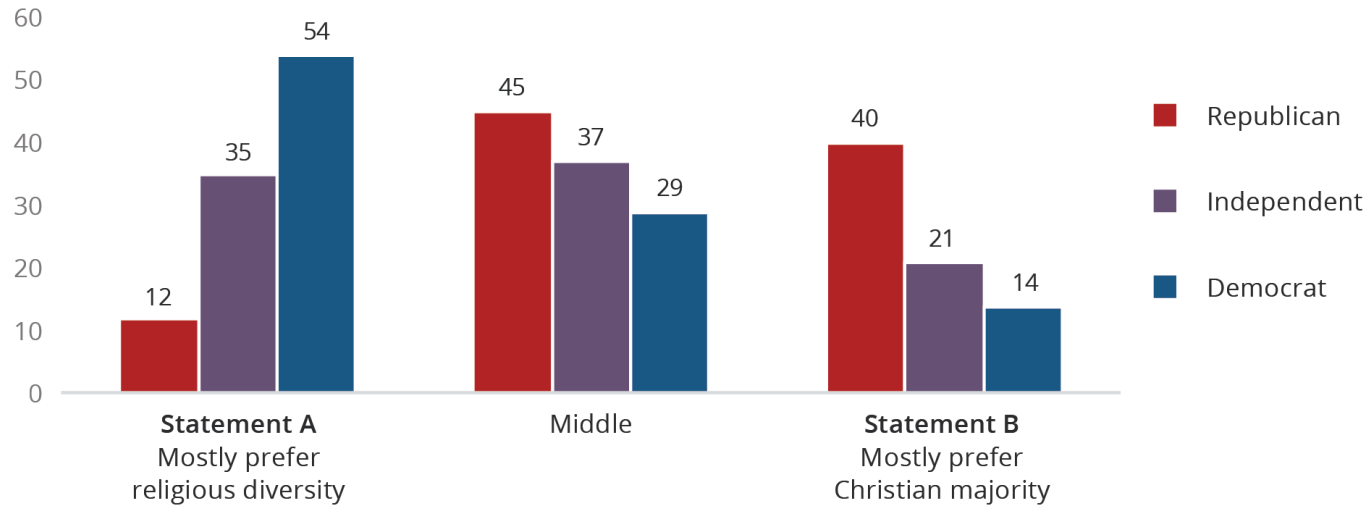

Statement A: A nation made up of people belonging to a wide variety of religions.

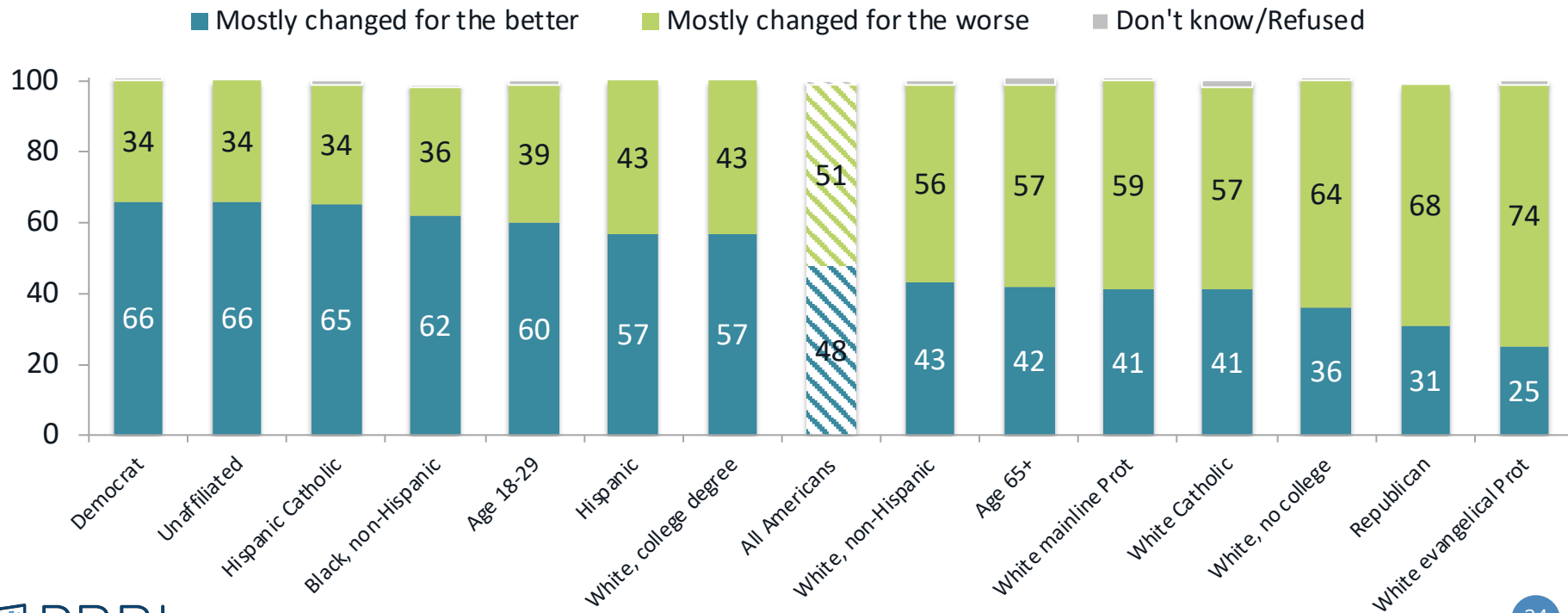
Statement B: A nation primarily made up of people who follow the Christian faith.

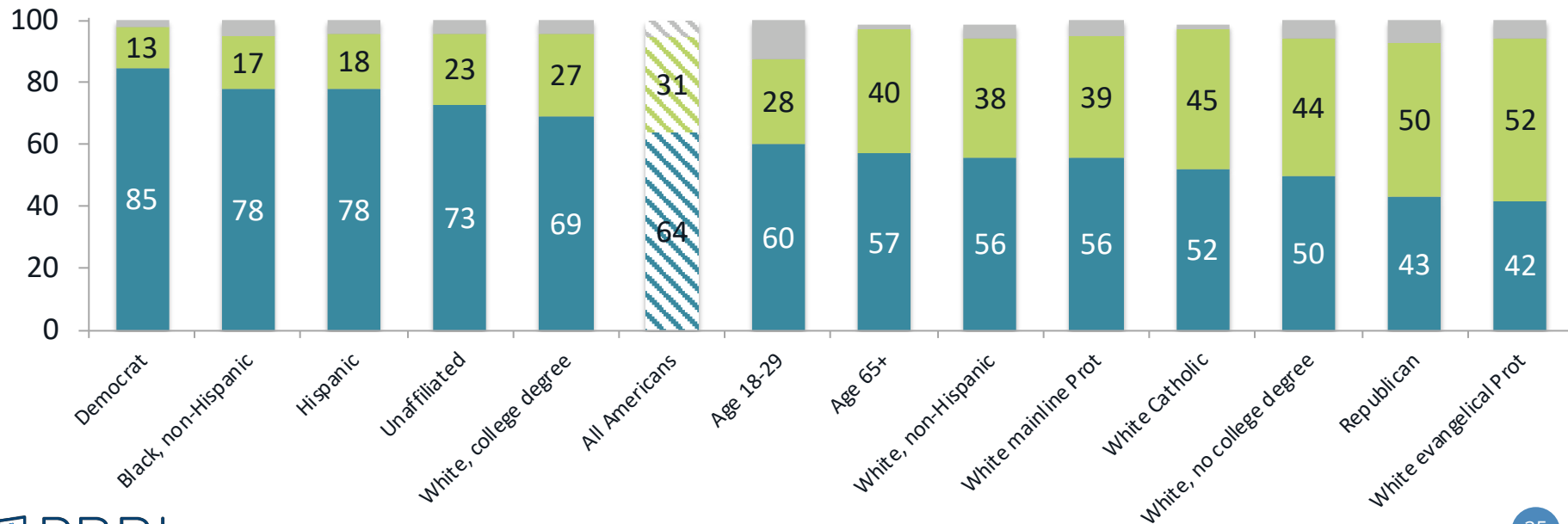
Since the 1950s, do you think American culture and way of life has mostly changed for the better, or has it mostly changed for the worse?
